
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

Dear Friend of the 1803 House,

Because of our membership, a very talented Board of Directors, and the generosity of the community, we continue to advance the historic significance of Jacob Ehrenhardt Jr.'s and his family's homestead. We especially appreciate the response to our annual financial appeal. Because of this generosity, we continue to create programs that enlighten the community about the history of Emmaus. We are making our fifth annual appeal on behalf of the 1803 House programs. We respectfully ask for your special financial support of this historically significant site in our community.

Thanks to efforts of the Borough of Emmaus and Eagle Scout, Sawyer Long, a new brick walk, was installed to provide handicapped accessibility to the interior of the House. "A Very Merrie Halloween" was again a success. We had more juried crafters, more children's activities, historic tours, pulled pork dinners and more. We continued with pretzel sales, beverages and literature sales at the Emmaus Farmers Market. The Old-Fashioned Christmas event is currently being planned. We are beginning further development of the property by establishing a new herb garden. We have officially acquired additional land contiguous to the 1803 House and the adjacent stream.

We continue our educational partnership with nearby Seven Generations Charter School and local school districts. We have held many educational events at the House for students, and have conducted tours for home schoolers, public school children, Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and individuals, upon request. Jacob Ehrenhardt's homestead and farm, supported solely by the Friends of the 1803 House, continues its formal relationship with the Borough of Emmaus and participates jointly with several of their special programs.

Our goals for next year include continued restoration and preservation of the House, more historic educational events, more acquisitions, completion of a site master plan, installation of a colonial fence between the property and the adjacent railroad property, completion of requests for grants, increased membership, and member participation. We are also planning paint restoration projects and further preservation of the kitchen/entry area.

A Very Merrie



Despite a soggy morning, A Very Merrie Halloween turned into a beautiful fall afternoon. Over 660 people visited the 1803 House to enjoy the festivities. Crafters and vendors sold fused glass, painted gourds, metal spooks, handmade soap, original jewelry, handmade baskets and quilted items, fall wreaths, American Girl clothing and Halloween costumes, homespun artwork, colorful Halloween witches and local fall produce. Brandon Swayser with the Wildlands Conservancy entertained young and old with "not-so-scary" wild creatures. Children decorated pumpkins, made fall wreaths, bird feeders, marched in a Halloween parade and listened to local author and artist Andi Metz's Halloween stories.

Returning from last year were Kraussdale alpacas and woven items, and a bake sale. Sweet Granny's kettle corn sold cider and flavored kettle corn. The Moravian church sold Moravian cakes, delicious corn chowder, and roasted nuts. Sweet Memories had unique and delicious confections for sale. Homemade apple dumplings, made by R & L Home Baked Goods in Harleysville, were sold and Smokin' Smitty's Catering sold pulled pork dinners and hot dogs. Nobody went home hungry!

New this year was the "Pick a Prize "raffle. Over 50 donated baskets were available for raffle, filled with items donated from each of the crafters, baking goods, gift cards, movie tickets, handmade crafts, artwork, golfing items and more.

Haunted gingerbread houses and the 1803 House created by Sadie Kennedy were on display inside the house and board member Janice Stavrou demonstrated weaving on an antique loom. Introducing the "1803 House Church Baby"



I am a little "1803 House Church Baby" doll,
made from a hankie and tied in knots, so small.

On the way to the Moravian church, little ones carry me holding me so carefully and when settled in the pews, we play together oh, so peacefully.

At times I may be dropped on the floor, but do not fear
I do not make any sound, which I want to make perfectly clear.

Of course babies love me as well,

When my head is filled with sugar cubes or candy, do tell.



The "1803 House Church Babies" are available at any 1803 House event or open house and the Emmaus Farmers Market for \$5.00 to \$8.00

Each Church Baby was created by a "Friends of the 1803 House" board member...



During the American Revolution War, toys, as well as many other household supplies, were scarce. Mothers made dolls from handkerchiefs, giving their children something to play with any time. This doll was at first called a "Church Doll," as it was used during those very long church services and, most importantly, if they were dropped, not a sound was heard.

Another name was a "Sugar Baby"...mothers would put sugar cubes or candy in the head portion and give the doll to the children to suck on during those long Sundays. They were also the only toy the children were allowed to play with on Sundays. Other names were "handkerchief doll," "pew doll," "pew baby" and "prayer doll."

At the turn of the century, around the time the 1803 house was built, these dolls were modified, with lace, ribbon and flowers, to look similar to our "1803 House Church Baby."
